- B. <u>Discussion of District Nurse Leader</u> Superintendent Bonneville reported that the newly hired District Nurse Leader will receive a stipend for situations involving coverage. She will also assist the school physician; develop wellness policy; and oversee SNAP benefits.

Phase II of this initiative would aim to identify the associated requirements to accommodate such growth. Ms. Larson seconded this motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Superintendent's Report for HRSD: August/September 2023

- <u>Central Office changes:</u> While we have someone out on extended medical leave, we've been most fortunate to have Camie Lamica, our new District Treasurer, take on additional responsibilities, along with Dee Thorne, a temp employee. Since Donna Giffune (Director of Health Services) decided not to work for our district, we will use part of her salary to offset these additional costs associated with the leave. Mickey Buhl and Nicole Heroux have been working diligently to learn the ropes and are wonderful assets to our team. Office morale has improved drastically. Five interviews for ASCIA occurred on August 8th by a committee of administrators, SC members, and staff. Our goal is to offer the position to someone by August 10th in order for all 5 school committees to approve the appointment on August 15th.
- <u>Technology:</u> We have a new IT Director from Suzor IT, Blake Mallett. Blake will be housed in the central office and will be here every day. Equipment has been ordered for our technology infrastructure upgrade, and due to back orders, this will most likely be fully completed in the Fall. Wifi upgrades have been made. Multi-step authentication process is a necessary prerequisite from our insurance carrier. While this can be a bit annoying, if we have any cybersecurity issues whatsoever, we will be covered. More info to follow.
 - Timeline: Firewall/ security component completed in September
 - o Finalize WiFi, including adding outdoor wifi, caf, and auditorium- October
 - Switches may not be completed until next summer due to backlogs
- <u>AP Scores</u> were recently released and the percentage of students who scored a 3 or better improved <u>significantly</u>- up by 16%! 92 students took 157 AP exams, and 72 of the 92 students scored 3 or better. These are the highest scores we have had over the past 5 years. Congratulations to our AP teachers for these incredible scores, especially in English Literature and Chemistry. While AP teachers most certainly are to be commended, I'd like to recognize that these are our HRSD collective scores, and everyone has played a role in getting our students to achieve at this level.
- <u>Preliminary MCAS scores</u> were just released to principals on August 8th and are currently embargoed.
 We are examining scores and student growth percentiles individually but will be analyzing them at the district level in October.
- MCAS scores raised: Starting with the Class of 2026, students will need to meet higher MCAS score requirements to graduate. Scores for English and math will need to be at least 486 (from 472), and 470 (from 220) for STEM tests
- Recognizing longevity: Since teacher start dates vary at every school (by 1 day or 2 days), we will not hold a convocation. While I would love to have an opportunity where all staff can get together, I recognize that principals need time to meet with their faculty, and the teachers need time to set up their classrooms. While I would generally recognize longevity at our convocation (5,10, 15, 20, 25, and 30+ years of service to HRSD), I would like to recognize and thank the following individuals at this time:

- Under the Healey-Driscoll administration, permanent funding for <u>universal free school meals</u> was
 passed in the state budget. Congressman Jim McGovern is working tirelessly to increase reimbursement
 levels so schools can serve locally grown, scratch-cooked meals that taste good and that students
 actually want to eat. No child should be hungry in school. Qualifying parents will still be encouraged to fill
 out free/reduced lunch forms in September for additional reimbursements to our schools.

<u>Safety Grant Update-We</u> applied for a safety grant after the police department conducted a threat assessment. We needed \$70,000 in upgrades. The grant announced the amount possible to apply for was approximately \$55,000. We were awarded \$28,000. With that amount we went back to the proposal and narrowed our focus to an alarm system and panic alarm to the police department. The total comes to \$28,000 which will include; blue strobe lights for outside to indicate a lockdown/emergency, a panic button which will notify the police department, and a school alarm system.

In room #19 We started to smell evidence of mold like we had two years ago. We decided to follow the recommendations from the mold remediation company from the previous incident and removed the

classroom rug and replaced it with flooring. We will be looking into doing that in grades K-2. Cost was \$5,000

<u>Fire Inspection issues and Cost-</u> Door adjustments \$1,294, elevator keys made for the lockboxes \$45, range hood cleaning and certificate \$330.

We put on hold but needs to completed:

• Exit light for library and emergency light outside main hallway back entrance. • Stage elevator out of service needs repair. Approximately \$9,000

<u>Fire Drill-</u>Our first fire drill was conducted on 9/5/23. There were no issues and all staff and students followed our fire evacuation protocols.

The PTO held the <u>Ice Cream Social</u> on Wednesday, September 6th. It was a fantastic event that was very well attended. There were many staff volunteers as well as high school student volunteers.
